This fellowship opportunity is open to researchers who are from a Black heritage background and are UK domiciled researchers who wish to conduct their research in the UK. They could have a degree from a UK Higher Education Institution or from an institution outside of the UK.

This Fellowship is for scientists who have a PhD in a relevant subject (or are due to complete PhD by March 2025). This Fellowship is a training and development position suitable for those who are looking for their first or second postdoctoral position.

We would like to recruit new Emerging Innovator fellows who are interested in our three priority areas:

- 1. Cell identity across the life course (including early development and ageing)
- 2. Sex differences in biology and disease
- 3. Gene-environment interactions (pertaining to the impact of endogenous and exogenous environmental determinants, including over-nutrition)

Fellows have access to a 1:1 bespoke coaching support, the extensive UKRI training package, regular symposia and LMS lecture series run throughout the year and annual postdoc and institute retreats.

What is the Emerging Innovators Fellowship?

Purpose and objectives

The LMS is excited to be working in partnership with the Medical Research Council's Black in Biomedical Research Advisory Group to create this fellowship opportunity. This Fellowship is for scientists who have a PhD in a relevant subject (or are due to complete PhD by March 2025). This Fellowship is a training and development position suitable for those who are looking for their first or second postdoctoral position.

The postdoctorate stage is key in establishing any scientist's independence, and data from HESA demonstrates that Black scientists are lost in greater proportion from the research postgraduate stage to postdoctorate level positions than any other ethnic group.

As a means of addressing the barriers that Black scientists face within academia and research environments, universities and research institutes such as the LMS are providing ringfenced opportunities at key scientific career stages to retain and grow talented individuals within the sector.

Black Other

Mixed – White and Black Caribbean

Mixed – White and Black African

Other mixed background (to include Black African, Black Caribbean, or Black Other)

Applicants must also be either:

UK domiciled researchers who wish to conduct their research in the UK. They could have a degree from a UK Higher Education Institution or from an institution outside of the UK.



Non-UK domiciled researchers who have studied in the UK for their undergraduate degree and/or PhD.
